On the 22d of January General Halleck wrote: "In regard to your proposed operations in Florida, the Secretary replied that the matter had been left entirely to your judgment and discretion with the means at your command. As the object of the pro-posed expedition has not been explained, it is im-possible to judge here of its advantages or practi-cability. If it is expected to give an outlet for cot-ton or open a favorable field for the enlistment of colored troops, he advantages may be sufficient to ingtife the arranase in monay. 
