We feel for them all fas brethren, and the popular heart seeks only the best mode of manifesting that sympathy in the most efficient and practical way. These fairs in other places have been productive of great results By this means Chicago has recently raised for this object \$60,000, Boston \$150,000, and Cincinnati more than \$200,000. 
