

THE WAR FOR THE UNION

FROM KENTUCKY, TENNESSEE, AND THE SOUTHWEST.

CAIRO, April 16.—The steamship Swallow, from Paducah at eight o'clock last night, reports all quiet and no fighting had occurred up to the time she left.

The 37th and 58th Kentucky (rebel) regiments are overrunning Western Kentucky. The rebels are constantly patrolling, taking every precaution to prevent the rebels from crossing by sinking and destroying all bridges and other crafts that could be used for that purpose.

CAIRO, April 16.—The steamer Glendale, from Memphis, has arrived. She passed Fort Pillow last evening. There was no appearance of the rebels and the river was all clear. Nothing was seen of the rebels but a mass of rifle balls and shrapnel were brought in.

CAIRO, April 17.—Late advices from Duval's Bluff report the country infested with guerrillas, who are constantly robbing and committing all manner of depredations. Mr. Nixon, the State representative from Franklin county, has been kidnapped, and his representative from the county kidnapped. Nothing has been heard from him since.

On the 11th inst. four hundred Texas Cavalry attempted to surprise a camp of two hundred and forty Federal Cavalry at the mouth of the river. They were repulsed with the loss of twelve killed and a large number wounded.

CHATTANOOGA, April 16.—All is quiet at the front, and there is no change in the situation of the rebel lines. Several rebel batteries and two non-commissioned officers and privates came into our lines last night. The rebels are reported to be ordered away from Dalton, and that several trains left before they came away.

A fire broke out in the brick block adjoining the military prison here this afternoon. The buildings, jointly occupied by the Quartermaster's and Provost Marshal's Departments and the Sanitary Commission, were destroyed before the fire was extinguished. The jail in which the rebel prisoners were confined was not damaged, and no prisoners escaped. No Government property was destroyed.

Major-General Newton goes to Cleveland tomorrow, and will have command of the Second Division of the Fourth Corps, which is commanded by Gen. Sheridan.

PORTERS MONROE. The Fort Royal party of the 14th report the capture of the side-wheel steamer "The Enterprise" on the 12th inst. near Davy's Island, Savannah River.

The steamer "The Enterprise" of the 10th inst. destroyed the Quartermaster's stores at Fort Royal. Eight hundred and thirty-five boxes of stores were captured on Cobb's Island, near the Eastern Shore, at 3 A. M. on the 15th, by Captain Chambers, of the First (loyal) Virginia, and his crew.

WASHINGTON, April 16.—General Budy Smith left for Cairo, and will take command of a brigade under the latter.
