Gunboats are constantly patrolling, taking every precaution to prevent the rebels from crossing by sinking and destroying all skiffs and other crafts that could be used for that parpose.

THE BILL AGAINST GOLD SPECULATION. THE BILL AGAINST GOLD SPECULATION.

The following is the bill which paised the Sen-to-day, and which awaits the action of the Honse:

Be it enacted. That it shall be unlawful to make any contract for the purchase or sale, or delivery of any gold coin or bullion, or of any foreign exchange to be delivered at any time subsequent to the making of such contract, or for the payment of any sum, either fixed or contingent, in default of the delivery of any gold coin or bullion, or of any foreign exchange, or upon other terms than the immediate manual delivery of such gold coin or bullion, or foreign exchange, and the immediate payment in full of the agreed price thereof by the manual delivery of United States notes or national currency, and not otherwise, or to make any contract whatever fer the sale, loan or delivery of which the person making such contract shall not at the time of making be the owner in actual possession.

nary place of business of either the seller or pur-chaser, owned or bired and occupied by him indi-vidually or by a partnership of which he is a memwidually or by a partnership of which he is a member.

Sec. 3. All contracts made in violation of this act shall be absolutely void.

Sec. 4. Any person who shall violate any provision of this act shall be held guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof, be fined in the sum of one thousand dollars, and be imprisoned for a period not less than three months nor longer than one year, or both, at the discretion of the Court.

Sec. 5. The pe. alsy imposed by the fourth section of this act may be recovered in an action at law in any court of record in the United States, or any court of competent jurisdiction, which action may be brought in the name of the United States, by any person who will sne for the said penalty: may be brought in the name of the United States, by any person who will sue for the said penalty; one-half for the use of the United States, and the other half for the use of the person bringing such action. And the recovery and satisfaction of a judgment in any such action shall be a bar to the imposition of any fine for the same offence, in any prosecution iretituted subsequent to the recovery of such judgment, but shall not be a bar to the infliction of punishment by imprisonment, as provided by the fourth section.

SEC 6. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with the provisions of this act are repealed.
