

money for the improvement of Delaware avenue. This work has been in progress for thirty years, and now that it is about being completed, Philadelphians can be found to seize the splendid advantages the munificent "merchant and mariner" gave us, and turn them against our trade, commerce, public safety, and against even the very business existence of the city. It is shameful.

IMPERIAL MEXICO.

A crown in Mexico and a castle in Spain will soon be regarded as synonymous expressions, unless something can be done_to reassure the Archduke Maximilian, who is the needy porphyro-genitus gentleman to whom the flattering prize has been offered by His Imperial Majesty, Napoleon III. The Archduke and his friends evidently think that it is a phantom crown that is held thus alluringly before him. He hesitates about reaching out his hand to take it, and he is specially particular that in case he does take it, he shall not forfeit his rights

to the succession of the imperial crown of Austria. Between him and the reigning Emperor there are only the lives of a couple of delicate children. Before consenting to be Emperor of Mexico, he is asked to renounce his chances of succeeding to his brother and these two children. This is rather a heavy sacrifice to make for the very doubtful chance of a permanent estab-

ishment in Mexico. Genius and great resources are required to create an Empire that will stand. The only one of recent establishment worth speaking of is that of France, and even that is not regarded by every one as very secure. Faustin, the first and last of the name, got up an empire in Hayti, but it was soon and easily overturned. The Archduke Maximilian has never shown any remarkable. talent at home, and he certainly does not appear to be the man to establish an empire in a distant land, where he cannot fail to be regarded by the people as an intruder. French bayonets may, for a time, give him possession of the Government. But the day will come when neither French nor any other European arms will be suffered to

control Mexico. All these suggestions and many others must have presented themselves to the minds of the Austrian prince and his friends, and thus caused the delay in settling the question of his acceptance of the proposed empire. There was an experiment with imperial rule once before in Mexico, which terminated with the execution of the brave but luckless Iturbide The history of that affair is so fresh in the memory of the world, that it will be strange if any one should be found courageous

enough to repeat the experiment.

THE RED RIVER CAMPAIGN.

There seems to be no reason to doubt that a portion of General Banks's army has suffered a severe disaster beyond Grand Ecore. Louisiana. The account received is cirumstantial, though not minute. At the same time, we cannot regard the loss suffered by General Ransom's force as seriously affecting the expedition. The main body of General Banks's army was still intact, and the fleet of gunboats was last reported ascending Red River, and expecting to reach Shreveport by the 12th. The land forces were to move in the same direction, and unless the rebel army is much larger than has been reported, we do not believe that it can make any very serious resistance. General Steele's army, advancing southward from Little Rock, must also be near Shreveport by this time, and the two armies combined ought to be sufficient to carry everything before them. While we deplorê the loss in the late battle, it is not by any means irreparable. We suffered much heavier blows before Port Hudson and Vicksburg, and yet those strongholds fell at last. last.

MUSICAL THE GERMAN OPERA COMPANY had a large andience last evening at the Onestnut Street Theatre, and they gave us a capital performance of The Bayber of Seville. Mme. Johannsen, Habel. mann and Steinecke, in the principal rôles, sang and acted admirably; and Graff and Kronfeld, as "Bartolo" and "Basilio," were excessively funny. This evening Faust is to be performed, and of course the house will be crowded. Great preparations are being made for the closing per-formance on Saturday, when, in honor of the Shakspeare tercentenary, the theatre will be illuminated and The Merry Wives of Windsor, music by Nicolai, will be produced. THE HANDEL AND HAYDN SOCIETY will, next

Wednesday evening, give their third and last concert of the season in the Musical Fund Hall, when they will produce Handel's great oratorio of Judas Maccabeus, for which they have been preparing for a long time. The Germania Orchestra will assist and a fine performance may be expected.



THE LATEST BAILBOAD OUTBAGE. If any reader of the BULLETIN would appreciate the infamous character of the scheme now before the legislature for running a railroad along Delaware avenue, and to allow the use of locomotives upon it, lethim pay a visit to the eastern part of the 'city during business hours. He will find, almost from the Navy Yard to Kensington, wharves strewed with goods, vessels discharging their cargoes, others loading with home produce for Europe and the West Indies, and a constant crowd of loaded vehicles and horses. From Pine street to Walnut, where the trade between Philadelphia, New York and Boston centres, where the Delaware Market is located, and where the great passenger outlet to New York is to be found, there is almost a constant jam of vehicles, through which a loaded dray can work its way only with difficulty. It would be no more possible and proper to run a locomotive through this locality than it would be to drive an engine through a crowded market-place, or to fire cannon loaded with grape-shot along Chestnut street, of a fine afternoon, without doing damage. There is one thing certain, to wit: that either the proposed railroad or the trade described must entirely occupy Delaware avenue. If this latest scheme of villainy is consummated through official corruption, the commerce of Philadelphia is just as completely ruined as though the port was sealed up, or as if by some convulsion of nature the course of the Delaware was changed and a new channel to the sea was opened across New Jersey from Burlington. We have no thought that such a road will be constructed, for we believe that the people would rise in mass and tear up the rails that were intended to ruin the city; but it would be shameful if the bill should be allowed to pass through the Legislature, and more particularly with the aid of recreant Philadelphians, who profess to represent the city they are legislating to destroy.
