Grant's purposes, and the fact of Grant sending out unusually large picket forces seems to have mystified the enemy on various occasions. Lee's army was preparing for a sudden move, but was seemingly disposed to wait for Grant to open and develop his game.

The movements of our gunboats up the Rappaharnock had raised an alarm in Richmond that Burnside was effecting a landing there, and a new slarm had been raised among the confederates of a movement by the Federals up the South side of James river.

C., and the capture of its gallant commander, Brigadier-General H. W. Wessels, and his command. This result however, was not obtained until the moet gallant and determined resistance had been made. Five times the enemy stormed the lines of the General, and as many times were they handsomely repulsed with great slaughter, and but for the powerful assistance of the rebel iron clad ram and the floating sharpshocter battery, the Cotton Plant, Plymouth would still have been in our hands. For their noble defence the gallant Gen. Wessels and his brave band deserve the warmest thanks of the whole country, while all will sympathica with them in their misfortune.

To the officers and men of the navy, the Commanding General tenders his thanks for their hearty co-operation with the army, and the bravery, determination and coolness that marked their part of the unequal contest. With sorrow he records the death of the noble sailor and gallant patriot Lieutenant-Commanding General believes that these misfortunes will tend not to discourage, but to nerve the Army of North Carolina to equal deeds of bravery and gallantry hereafter.
