Baker sworn—I have the supervision of the manufactory all the time; am inconstant communication with the engineer; I never smelled liquer upon him; consider him ever, way trustworthy and competent; everybody who knows him says the same thing; I was at the manufactory at 12% o'clock Sunday; I had a conversation with the engineer then respecting the michinery, &c.; he said everything was all right; I observed the boilers—no fire in them—the water was cold, and running out of the cocke; there was no alteration made in the boilers; a change had been made in the injector to suit the new engines that had just been introduced; owing to the extra work, we placed another man to assist the engineer; steam is required to work the injector; the sunply of water is received through an iron pipe from the street main; the engineer had charge of the boilers and engine; by standing in a certain place the boilers and engine; by standing in a certain place the boilers and engine; by standing in a certain place the boilers and the engine was about twenty-five feet.

Wm R Brinckle, sworn—Employed at Cornelius & Baker's as clerk; I got to the office about twenty five minutes past seven; saw the engineer in the office; don't think he was there more then a minute; the explosion took place about five or six ninutes after he went out; before leaving the office I examined the gange, and it stood 65 lbs.
