# Controllers of the Public Schools. A stated meeting was held yesterday

Samuel Scheide, Controller for the 14th section appeared, was sworn, and took his seat as a member.

A communication from the Ninth Section stated that the basement of the Zane street schoolhouse is over a well, and was caving in. This was referred to the appropriate Committee.
The following communication from the

male Principals of Public Schools was read: To the Board of School Control: The undersigned, a committee of the Association of Male Principals of Public Schools, appointed for the purpose, would respectfully represent that we have suffered so much, in common with all the teachers and others connected with the public schools, in not having the meagre amount of our salaries paid when the warrants for the same are due or in having to submit to a considerable discount when the full amount, promptly paid, is insufficient, that we are compelled to ask for a change.

We would, therefore, request you to ask of the State Legislature the passage of a law requiring that the whole amount of money appropriated by the Legislature of the Com monwealth of Pennsylvania for the First School District, and levied by the Councils of the city of Philadelphia for school purposes, shall be set apart by the Receiver of Taxes and the City Treasurer, and held sub-ject to the order of the Board of Controllers, to be used for school purposes, and for no

other purpose whatever.

The above measure has already been under consideration by city officials, and it has been recommended by the Board of Controllers, through their President, in the last annual report, to which we beg to refer, and

also by the President of one branch of Councils at the late organization.

# AARON E. HUNTER, Committee. 3 E. B. 33

The Committee on Qualifications Teachers reported the result of the examination held at the Marshall School, Frank-ford road, with the names of applicants who were recommended for teachers' certi-

ficate. The report was accepted. The amendment to the rules of the Board, offered at the last meeting, requiring the office of the Board closed after 5 P. M., was amended to 3 P. M., and then passed.

Mr. Shippen moved to proceed to the consideration of the teachers' communication. sideration of the teachers' communication. For years, he said, the teachers have been insufficiently paid, and with this meagreness of pay they are not paid their full salaries. They are obliged to peddle their warrants through the streets of the city. This is all wrong. Were the proper amount assessed for school purposes extended for the schools, there would be no difficulty. Councils levy the whole amount of taxes fixed by law, but they appropriate to the fixed by law, but they appropriate to the Board of School Control only about two-thirds of the sum. The schools are made to suffer for the discrepancies and the deficiencies of the other departments. All this is radically unjust. The schools, while spending only a portion of the money levied for their support, get credit for the entire sum. To remedy this, Mr. Shippen said the teachers had at last taken the case into their own hands, and requested the Board to petition the Legislature to enforce by orance the expenditure of the school taxes for school purposes alone. In further car-

rying out the suggestion, Mr. Shippen submitted the following:

Section 1. Be it enacted, &c., That the whole amount of taxes laid, levied or assessed by the Councils of the city of Phila-delphia, for the support of public schools and for school purposes for the year 1866, and in each succeeding year, shall be credited upon the books of the City Treasurer and of the City Controller as a whole sum, and the same shall be subject to the drafts of the Controllers of Public Schools, by warrant duly countersigned by the City

Controller.

SEC. 2. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer of the city of Philadelphia to set apart from each payment of city taxes into the treasury such ratable proportion of said payment as the amount levied for of purposes during the said year bears to the entire amount levied for all city purposes. He shall pay the same forthwith into a separate and distinct account, to be kept in a bank designated by the Control lers of Public Schools, and shall keep distinct and separate accounts thereof in the books of his office. He shall in like manker pay into the same account all moneys peceived by him by virtue of appropriations by the Commonwealth for the use of the public schools of the city of Philadelphia, and the same shall be subject to the drafts of the Controllers of the Public Schools, countersigned as aforesaid. to be used for school purposes, and no

Adjourned. From Hansas. LAWRENCE, Kansas, Jan. 9.—The Kansas Legislature will meet at Topeka to-day. Governor Crawford's message recommends the removal of the various Indian tribes in the State to the Indian territory, and that patents be issued to those having settled homes, thereby enabling them to dispose of their lands, if they desire, and move with others; and if not, that their land may be

held subject to taxation, like that of other settlers. The establishment of a Bureau of Immigration, and the reorganization of new counties west of the fifteenth meridian, are recommended, and the Federal Government is urged to extend surveys to that point a the earliest possible time. The policy of selling the above mentioned lands is advised, the Governor arguing that present immigration is above all entitled to the benefit of these lands. The Governor also urges the importance of sustaining the Federal Administration in every good and laudable effort to preserve the nation's dignity and maintain its honor.
