WASHINGTON, Jan. 18,—The Ways and Means Committee came to no conclusion to-day in regard to the loan bill. They are pretty well agreed to everything except its

foreign clause. The Reconstruction Committee are taking evidence. They have had several persons before them, Treasury agents and others, who have been traveling South for six or eight months. The evidence elicited does not benefit the chances of admission of Southern
