Answers to Correspondents. A LOOKER-ON IN VIENNA. Your conjectures in both quarters are correct. Several of the older players are at this time elsewhere. We shall be glad to hear from you again.

THE PHILADELPHIA CHESS CLUB. The Philadelphia Chess Club having been compelled to abandon its old quarters in consequence of the building being required for other purposes, a pleasant room has been secured and fitted up for its accommodation in another locality.

PROBLEM No. 419. We learn from the last number of the Illustration that this problem is only solvable in five moves. The solution in five moves is exceedingly pretty.

First Class. The contest between Mr. Mackenzie and Charles H. Stanley, who are considered the best two players in the tournament, has been concluded, and Mr. Mackenzie is the victor. Six games were played, three of which were won by Mr. Mackenzie, one by Mr. Stanley, and two were drawn.

Second Class. Dr. Ward has concluded his play with Mr. Graham, winning two games, Mr. Dill and General De Trobriand have played two games, both of which were won by the former. Messrs. Warner and Delmar have played two games; one was won by Mr. Warner, and the other was drawn. None of the second series of games have been played by the victors of the first class.
