SENATE,-Mr. Hoge offered a series of resolutions, which were laid over, protesting against the policy of Congress in continuing

the excessive duty on crude petroleum which is alike injurious to the producer and which is ante injurious to the producer and to the government. They recommend an ad valorem instead of specific tax, and that no duty shall be exacted from wells not exceeding eight barrels a day. Mr. McConagby called up the bill pro-viding for the relief of the citizens of Cham-bersburg by appropriating \$300,000 out of

bersburg by appropriating \$500,000 out of the State Treasury. After a short debate the bill passed finally

by a vote of 18 to 12.

The Eight Hour Law. - Wednesday even-ing next was set apart for the discussion of ing next was set apart for the discussion of the Eight Hour law. The original act, which was presented by Mr. Donnelly, pro-posed to apply only to Philadelphia, but the originator designs amending so as to apply to the whole State, and make eight hours a day's labor in every county. Messrs. Donnelly and Quigley, of Philadel-phia, yesterday urged the immediate pas-sage of the measure and made encoded in sage of the measure, and made speeches in its behalf.

Shenango Railroad—Au act incorporating the Shenango Valley Railroad Company (from the Ohio State line to the Pittsburgh and Erie Canal) was called up, and opposed by Mr. McCreary, of Erie county, on the ground that by merely constructing three miles of road as proposed, the business of the coal fields of Mercer county, Pa., would be taken to Cleveland, instead of the city of Erie, where it properly belonged. This idea was repudiated by Mr. Waddell, of Chester, who endorsed the originators of the bill as among the most responsible business Chester, who endorsed the originators of the bill as among the most responsible business men of Pittsburgh. The debate was con-tinued by Messrs. Sturdivant, Negley, Barr, Mann and Thomas, and various motions were made resulting in the final passage of the bill.

The House agreed to adjourn, with the concurrence of the Senate, from Thurs-day, (to-morrow), until Tuesday next, at 10 A. M., in order to allow the Committee on Ways and Means to visit the institutions soliciting State aid. A special session was then ordered for


