LEGISLATIVE PROCEEDINGS.

From Washington. [Special Despatch to the Bulletin.] WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—The House Naval Committee, with a few invited guests, left this morning to visit the Naval Academy, at Annapolis.

The Committee have a proposition before them to remove the Academy from its present site. The Committee desired to satisfy themselves respecting the matter before they took any action.

The refusal of the Republican caucus to adopt any extreme measures, making an issue with the President, is strongly endorsed by all the more moderate Republicans.

A secret meeting was held last night by a number of friends of the Mexican government in this city to devise some plan whereby some substantial aid may be secured to the Liberal cause; also, to urge upon the President to send a Minister to that country at once.

Secretary Seward's telegraph to the President endorsing his speech is variously commented upon to-day.

From Georgia. MILLEDGEVILLE, Feb. 23.—The Legislature has passed a resolution cordially endorsing the address of Mr. Stephens, delivered yesterday, and orders it put on the journal of both Houses.

The financial committee appointed by the convention, after session of fifty-four days, and after hearing sworn testimony report that there is no evidence found of corruptions or of the improper use of the public money by any State official, from Governor Brown down to the lowest official agent, and report a full and complete acquittal of the late State administration of every charge made against it.

WASHINGTON, FEB. 24TH. THE SENATE IS IN SESSION TO-DAY. HOUSE.—The House went into Committee of the Whole on the President's message.

CITY BULLETIN.

SUICIDE OF A SOLDIER.—James Hall, a member of Company B, 29th Maine Veteran Volunteers, committed suicide last night in a cell at the Nineteenth Ward Police Station. He was on his way to Boston and missed the train. Being a stranger in the city, he was taken to the Police Station and remained until the starting of the next train. During the afternoon he suddenly started up, leaped through a window and ran about three squares. He was then captured, and it was found that he was laboring under temporary insanity. He was taken back to the station house and was locked up in a cell. Between eleven and twelve o'clock last night he cut his throat with a pocket knife. The deceased was 31 years of age and belonged to Belfast, Maine, where he has a wife and child residing.

A YOUTHFUL ROBBER.—Robert Cressman, aged 15 years, was arrested yesterday in the fifteenth Ward, on suspicion of larceny. He had in his possession a pair of ladies' gaiters. Upon arriving at the Station-house he was identified by an officer from Reading as having been concerned in the robbery of a store on Penn street, in that city. He had a hearing before Alderman Hutchinson, and was sent back to Reading for trial. This morning, at four o'clock, two young men, who came to the city on the Reading train, last evening, were found sleeping in a stable, on Fifteenth street, near Callowhill. They were arrested on suspicion of having been concerned in the same robbery, and were locked up for a hearing.

ATTEMPTED MURDER.—This morning Christopher Green was before Alderman Toland, upon the charge of assault with a battery, with intent to kill. It seems that at two o'clock, this morning, he was in front of a tavern on Margaretta street, near New Market, kept by a man named Moffat. He was very noisy and Moffat ordered him away. Green is alleged to have drawn a knife, and made an attack on Moffat. The latter was cut on the lip and chin, and was also struck on the breast, but the blade of the knife merely went through his clothing. The accused was committed in default of \$1,000 bail to answer at court.

UNIVERSITY OF PENNSYLVANIA.—Washington's birthday was appropriately celebrated at the University of Pennsylvania. The faculty and the students assembled at ten o'clock. Rev. Dr. Goodwin, the Provost, presided, and opened the exercises with a fervent prayer. Washington's farewell address was read by Mr. W. A. Lamberton, of the Junior class. Then followed a very fine oration upon the life and character of Washington, delivered by Mr. George Thomas Graham, of the Senior class. The University Light Artillery, Capt. Dickey, was present in full uniform, and took part in the proceedings.

GENERAL CHAMBERLAIN.—We understand that this gallant officer, who preceded by his oration on Thursday that his pen is as mighty as his sword, will visit the Union League House this evening. Few officers have a more brilliant record than General Chamberlain, and he will no doubt receive a warm welcome from the loyal gentlemen of the League.

THE LIBRARY OF MR. POULSON.—The late Mr. C. A. Poulson has left his curious and valuable collection of local woodcuts, illustrations, books, &c., to the Philadelphia Library. He also left five hundred dollars to pay the expenses incident to the arrangement of the books. We are glad this disposition has been made of the curious collection.

POCKET PICKED.—Mrs. Catharine Beaver, of Chester county, had her pocket picked in a store on Eighth street yesterday afternoon. The pocket was cut from her dress, and the thief ran across her purse, but it contained only a small amount of money.

DISCHARGING FIREARMS.—Three young men were arrested yesterday afternoon by Lieut. Luger, at Fairmount Park, for shooting at a target. They were taken before Alderman Hutchinson and were fined for a violation of an ordinance of the city.

MORE WOODEN BUILDINGS.—The High Constables yesterday ordered to be taken down two wooden stables, which had been erected contrary to the provisions of an ordinance of the city.

Philadelphia Markets. SATURDAY, Feb. 24.—The Flour market continues as listless as ever, and the only transactions reported are for a few barrels of extra family at \$2 1/2 per barrel, and small lots for the supply of the city. Consumers ranging from \$2 1/2 for low grade superfine up to \$2 1/2 for fancy brands—according to quality. Small sales of Rye Flour at \$1 1/2. In Corn Meal nothing doing and prices are nominal.

There is very little good wheat here and other descriptions of wheat are scarce. Sales of 500 bushels good and prime Penna. Red at \$1 1/2 per bushel, and 500 bushels common Michigan at \$1 1/4. In the absence of sales of White wheat at \$2 1/2 per bushel. Rye is steady; sales of 100 bushels at \$1 1/2 per bushel. Corn is quiet, with small sales of yellow at 65 cents. Oats are steady at \$1 1/2 per bushel.

In Lard and Malt no change. Sales of the latter at \$1 1/2 per bushel.

The receipts of Cloverseed are light but the demand has fallen off. Small sales at \$2 1/2 per bushel. Timothy at \$2 1/2 and Flaxseed at \$2 1/2 per bushel.
