INTERESTING TO COTTON BROKERS.-Col. John H. Taggart, Collector of Internal Revenue, of the 1st District of Pennsylvania, has issued the following circular: The at-tention of Cotton Brokers is called to the tention of cotton Brokers is carred to the fact, that the regulations of the Treasury Department require that cotton, packed in bales, shall contain a metal tag or inspection label, showing that the Internal Revenue Taxes on the same have been paid, attested by the Collector of Internal Revenue of the district from whence the cotton is shipped. In addition to this, all consignments of cotton should be accompanied by ments of cotton should be accompanied by a permit from the Collector of Internal Revenue of the district from whence the cotton is shipped, describing the marks and numbers on the bales, their weight, and certifying that the Internal Revenue Taxes cernying that the Internation on the same have been paid, and granting permission for removal. Information has been received at this office, that considerable quantites of cotton have been sent to this market, without complying with the regulations of the department in this parregulations of the department in this par-ticular, no inspection labels being on the bales, and no permits forwarded with the consignment. The absence of these proofs that the Internal Revenue Taxes have been paid, renders the cotton liable to seizure by Collectors of Internal Revenue, no matter in whose hands found.

To cure these affections we must bring into action the muscles, which are engaged in their various functions. If they are neglected, Gravel or Dropsy may ensue. ensue.
