From Washington. [Special Despatch to the Bulletin.] Washington, March 10.—The Ways and

Means Committee meet to-day for the purpose of determining the amount of the reduction that shall be made in the internal revenue receipts. It is proposed to reduce them some seventy-five millions. When that is decided, the Committee will

proceed to reduce the tax on such articles as are now regarded as taxed too heavily. They have already decided to take the tax off of dress-making, millinery and tailoring -three important items.

For the first time in ten days no delegations have to-day called upon the President. Several are said to be anxiously waiting or an opportunity.

The increase of the duty on coal by the House, in the reciprocity bill, of one dollar and twenty five cents per ton has fearfully demoralized the Canadian lobby, who were here to prevent that very thing.

Admiral Smith and Commodore Turner (the latter having charge of the iron clads), are to be heard on Monday next, by the House Naval Committee on the League Island question.

From Texas. GALVESTON, March 8th, 1866.—A census of the inhabitants of Texas is to be taken every ten years, dating from Feb. 6, 1860. A motion to make the number of white inhabitants the basis of representation was laid on the table. A motion to strike out the word white was lost, yeas 26, nays 47. A motion to leave it optional with the Leg-

islature to add other inhabitants of the State to the basis of representation was lost, yeas 26, nays 38. The judiciary committee reported in favor of making the Supreme Court consist of four associates, to hold office for ten years at an annual salary of \$4,500; district judges at an annual salary of

\$3,500; attorney-general, \$3,000. A proposition was made to confer on the Legislature the power to divide Texas into two States, one State to lie between Trinity and Red rivers. It was referred to a special

committee. The ordinance annulling the ordinance of secession is still under discussion. New York advices have caused a decline of ten per cent. in boots and shoes, and in domestic goods fifteen per cent. The market is dull. The latest report from the plantations are very favorable. General Wright, medical inspector, has determined on vigorous sanitary measures as a precaution against the cholera.

Release of Mallory. NEW YORK, March 10th.-The Daily News states that orders were received yesterday for the release on parole of S. S. Mallory, the former rebel Secretary of the Navy. He was the last of the prisoners of state at Fort Lafayette.

SUFREME COURT—Chief Justice Woodward and Justices Strong, Read and Agnew, This morning an interesting case was argued—Maitby vs. The Reading and 4 climble Railroad Company. Mr. Maitby, a nenresident of the State of Pennsylvania, is a holder of the coupon bonds of the railroad company. These bonds pay seven per cent. On Mr. Maitby presenting his warrants the company refused to pay them in full, claiming the right to deduct from them an amount equal to three mills on every dollar of the principal, by virtue of the Act of Assembly imposing a lax to that extent on the bonds. The plaintiff deales the right to trake this deduction, and asks that the railroad company be decreed to pay him the amount of the interest confracted for, and that if any tax be due that the railroad company be decreed to Day it themselves. The case was argued and submitted.
