PHILADELPHIA COUNTY PRISON,-The PHILADELPHIA GOUNTY PRISON.—Thenineteenth annual report of the Inspectors of the
county prison for 1865, made to the Legislature, has
just been issued: It states that the total number of
commitments for the year 1863 was 16,142. This was
not a very large increase over those for 1864, which
were 19,667. It is less than those for 1884, which were
17,219 and more than one fifth less than those for 1860
which amounted to 29,801.
The entire increase in the commitments for 1865 was
of white males. Thus there were 10,461 white males
committed against 8,983 for the previous year, and of
white women only 4,892 against 3,771 for the previous
year. white women only very state of the prisoners were \$69.952 33. The profits of the manufacturing department were \$2.957 89, and the amount received for the support of united states prisoners \$932 25. This leaves the cutial cost to the city for the maintenance of the prison \$89 22 33.

During the year six deaths occurred in the convict department. Two of them were from suicide: one from consumption and one from sphills.




