Mr. McManes moved to approve the report, exscinding the item to the Seventeenth Section, \$4,690.50. In this section there are twelve Directors, nine being Democrats. At the last election for Controllers, four Democrats voted for Mr. Mc. Manes, a Republican, and elected, him to the Board. The party clamor in the ward terrified the Democrats, and they struck Mr. McManes' name from their list of Directors. He applied to the Court and procured a mandamus for the calling of his name at the meetings of the Directors, but

name at the meetings of the Directors, bu the mandamus has never yet been obeyed. Seven Directors are a quorum of the Directors, and Mr. McManes declared that when only six were present they approved their accounts.

The amended report was agreed to Mr. Freeborn, Chairman of the Commit Mr. Freeborn, Chairman of the Committee on Boys, High School, presented a somewhat lengthy report, which, after stating that many complaints had been made about the inefficiency of the High School, both to the Board of School Controllers and through Councils, went on to narrate, at length, the measures the committee had taken to ascertain the cause of this disaffection. The committee had taken to ascertain the cause of this disaffection. mittee, as a result of their inquiries, became convinced that the trouble arose from the incapacity and neglect of the present Principal of the school. Believing this to be the fact, they had, on the 27th of February, re-quested him to resign, but, as no notice of the request had been taken, they offered and desired the Board to accept a resolution re-

moving Mr. Maguire.
Mr. Freeborn said it was not the intention of the committee to press the resolution at this time. It was their desire that the whole Board should have an opportunity to examine the testimony taken before the committee. It was urged in Councils that when the appropriation was made, that, to the High School should be erased from the bill, and school should be erased from the bill, and 'eighteen members voted to do so. The committee felt that to Mr. Maguire's management was owing to the ill odor into which the High School had fallen. He desired that

on the third Tuesday of next month a special meeting of the Board be held, and the evidence be printed.

Mr. Money, of the Twenty-sixth, desired that Mr. Magnire should be present before

the committee.
Mr. Freeborn said that Mr. Maguire had been notified that the examination was about to be made, and he had not been present.

A SUPPLEMENT TO AN ORDINANCE ENTITY of Philadelphia to contract for the deansing of the city of Philadelphia to contract for the cleansing of the streets of the city."

SECTION 1. The Select and Common Councils of the City of Philadelphia do ordain, That all the payments to be made under the contracts to be entered into by virtue of the ordinance entitled "An ordinance to authorize the Mayor of the city of Philadelphia to contract for the cleaning of the streets of the city of provided March 2, 1866, shall be payable in warrants drawn by the Mayor upon the City Treasurer, in equal monthly installments; and one-tenth of the amount of each of said monthly justallments shall be retained by the city to be appropriated as hereinafter directed. Provided that when the sum so retained on each contract shall amount to five thousand dollars, the remaining payments may, at the option of the Mayor, be paid in full as they shall thereafter become use.

SEC. 2. The Chief Inspector of Streets shall overlook

the remaining payments may, at the option of the Mayor, he yaid in full as they shall thereafter become due.

SEC. 2 The Chief Inspector of Streets shall overlook and supervise the work of the centractors, and report any neglect on their part to the Mayor, and to the Committee on Street Cleansing, and notify the contractor of rontractors of his or their neglect. If after such report and notice the contractors, or any of them, shall not immediately remedy the complaint, the Committee on Street Cleansing, may direct the Chief Inspector of Streets to perform the work at the expense of the contractors or contractors in default, the cost of performing the same to be paid out of the amount heretofors authorized to be retained, and the Mayor is hereby authorized to draw warrants for that purpose on presentation of the bills: therefore by the Chief inspector of Streets.

Sec. 8. The contract to be drawn by virtue of the said ordinance land of this ordinance, shall contain a special provision and stipulation that all questions and matters in dispute, both of law and of fact, arising undersaid contracts respectively; shall be determined by the Mayor, and his decision neon any question whatever relating to the said contracts; or either of them, or to the performance of the same, shall be final and conclusive upon the parties concerned.
