THE BROAD STREET RAILROAD.

One of the writers for the Reading Railroad Company states that the interest owned by the city in the North Pennsylvania Railroad Company amounts to \$2,500,000, and to sever the connection by rail of this road with the southern side of the city, will deprive it of a facility it now enjoys.

The connecting railroad, now being constructed, will cross the North Pennsylvania road at grade, will furnish facilities for sending Lehigh coal to the northern and southern parts of the city, without obstructing Broad street with long teams of mules, and without paying a tax to the Reading Railroad Company of about thirty cents per ton, and the interest of the city in the North Pennsylvania road will be promoted by severing the connection.
