NEW PUBLICATIONS.

"Au Eirenicon," by E. B. Pusey, D. D. D. Appleton & Co. New York. Whatever is written by Dr. Pusey is pretty sure to be marked by great ability and a decided character of Christian courtesy. However much his peculiar religious opinions may be objected to, no one can well refuse him the praise of unfailing urbanity and kind consideration for the opposing convictions of his adversaries. "An Eirenicon" is no exception to this rule. It is an answer to Archbishop Manning, the Catholic prelate of Westminster, and seeks to show that the English Church is a part of Christ's one Holy Catholic Church, and "a means of restoring visible unity." The first point seems hardly to need argument, nor does it require any labored proof, save when a member of the Roman Church is to be dealt with. All the objections to this view urged by Dr. Manning, are most satisfactorily disposed of in this volume. Dr. Pusey shows the insufficiency of Dr. Manning's demurs, and vindicates the English Church from all his charges. It is of course impossible in a brief notice to give the whole argument. The reader will be surprised and probably considerably instructed at Dr. Pusey's able handling of the Articles and formularles of the English Church. He shows that she rejects no truths, holds no erroneous views on the number and nature of sacraments—rejects only conceptions which have crept into the Roman faith in the progress of ages, and lightly regards the authority of General Councils. These and similar truths are sustained in the volume with a wealth of learning and exactness of logic truly admirable. The doctrines of the Roman church, on the other hand, in regard to those points in which she differs from the English Church, are most kindly but most clearly pointed out, and we hardly see how a candid mind can read the exposition without being convinced of the facts asserted.

Still, we cannot indulge any lively hope that unity will be restored to the universal Church by any amount of arguments or explanation. The faith, as held by the great mass of christians of different communions. differs so much from the faith to be drawn from their formulas of faith where exactly anterpeeted, that the old adage, "He that's convinced against his will, will have the same opinion still," will, we fear, apply to the Christian Church, and keep its communions separated, till the good spirit of God, filling all souls with outflowing love, shall work out "all pride, prejudice and passion," and make men of one mind by first making them of one heart. This book, however, will repay perusal, even if it fail to produce conviction. For sale by Ashmead & Evans.
