The mineral development in Pennsylvania, moreover, will each year make the joint tonnage of the steam power roads contrastmore overwhelmingly against those of New York. In population, besides, as in traffic, Pennsylvania is making rapid increase in its cities and towns and in its coal iron and oil regions. And hence, from these causes of growth, these elements of greatness, it is the destiny of Pennsylvania to surpass New York as well in population as in products.

At the time of the first U.S. Census—1790—Virginia, then the "Old Dominion," contained the largest population, Pennsylvania next, New York third. In 1810, however, New York surpassed Pennsylvania, and in 1820 she also surpassed Virginia and became the "Em-pire State." But in the nature of things it is decreed that the sceptre of this honor must depart from the grasp of New York into the iron hand of Pennsylvania.
