The managers have purchased the property No. 308 South Eleventh street, and are already preparing it for the reception of the boys. About \$20,000 have already been subscribed, and \$10,000 more are needed to start the enterprise upon a substantial

foundation.

The amount of subscriptions already received in the short period of three weeks, and from those who examine well the merits of an undertaking before giving it encouragement, proves the great claim this institution has on the sympathies of our citizens. Governor Curtin's heart has been in this method of caring for the orphans of deceased soldiers, and it has soothed the dying hours of many a brave man to know that the Governor's wishes in this respect would be carried out carried out.

This Institution will soon be self-supporting, as each boy, as soon as he can read, write and cipher, will be put in a position to earn something towards his support. We sincerely trust that the amount still required to buy and furnish the house will be sub-scribed before another week passes. FUNERAL OF COLONEL CARR.—The funeral of Colonel Robert Carr took place this morning from his late residence, Thirty-fourth street, near Market, West Philadelphia, and was largely attended. There was a fair representation of the members of the Historical Society, Typograpical Societies and the Soldiers of the War of 1812, notwithstanding the inclemency of the

weather. Colonel Carr was Lieutenant Colonel of the 15th Regiment of United States Infantry, commanded by Colonel Cromwell Pearce, in the war of 1812, and was in the battle in which General Pike lost his life, and was also engaged in the capture of York in Up-per Canada in April 1813, and Fort George in Upper Canada in May 1813. After the war he was Colonel of a regiment of Pennsylvania militia and served as Adju-tant General of Pennsylvania during the administration of Governor Heister. He was the last surviving field officer of the Regular army in the war of 1812 in the States of Panneylyania New Jorges States of Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Delaware. He was one of the earliest and most active members of the Peunsylvania
Association of Soldiers of the war of 1812; was one of its vice presidents and at the last meeting on the 22d of February read Washington's Farewell Address without epectacles, so well was his sight preserved.

SUICIDE.-John F. Rabas, a German, was found dead, yesterday morning, in his Guillord street. Fourth Ward. He hung by the neck from a hook which he had driven into the wall. He had been suffering from palsy, for some weeks, and had been heard to express a wish that he was dead. Papers found on the person of the deceased, show that he had been a private in the 15th New York heavy artillery, Co. I. He had applied, through the United States Sanitary Commission, as agents, for a pension, but thus far had not obtained it. A letter in his pocket written in German, is translated thus

I was a soldier in the 15th New York heavy artillery, United States army. I got a disease in the service, from the effect of which I was obliged to stop work. In consequence I applied for a pension from the United States Government. Not receiving any support from the Government this is any support from the Government, this is

to inform my friends and acquaintances that I have been obliged to kill myself.

John Rabas, from Gotha.

The unfortunate man was forty-eight years of age. Among his papers was a patent, written upon parchment, certifying that Frederick Rabas was bootmaker by appointment to the court of the Duke of appointment to the court of the Duke of Saxe-Coburg Gotha, and also to several ther of the German courts. The bootmaker was the brother of the suicide.

THE GOLD EXCITEMENT NEAR WASH-THE GOLD EXCITEMENT NEAR WASH-INGTON.—From our exchanges we understand that considerable interest is attached to the recent discovery of rich deposits of auriferous pyrites and gold-bearing quartz on the Potomac, this side of the Great Falls. It is stated that the property has been purchased by Philadelphians. A stock company has been organized, with a capital of 375,000 dollars, and the stock absorbed. A powerful engine, with all its accompaniments for quartz crushing and sublimating the ore is on the ground, the erection of a quartz mill on the ground, the erection of a quartz mill completed, and Cornish miners, under the direction of an engineer, are penetrating the rich ledges of the property. The assets of the company, which is entitled the Maryland Mining Company, consist of a tract of and containing 120 cores. Mariles and containing 120 acres, 14 miles west of Georgetown, D.C., on which they have three gold-bearing quartz ledges. The surface rock exhibited to us by the president of the company, shows free gold in large quanti-ties. The mint assay of the surface rock yields \$116 per ton of 2,000 pounds. The sul-phurets are in excess of that. Specimens of phures are in excess of that. Specimens of recent excavation, on exhibition at the company's rooms, in this city, are pronounced by miners equal in character and richness to anything produced from the mines of California or Nevada. An assay of such rock as ishere exhibited, would, it is estimated, yield \$20,000 per ton. mated, yield \$20,000 per ton.

The principal causes of death were—croup, 8; consumption, 42; convulsions, 13; disease of the heart, 10; scarlet fever, 5; typhoid fever, 7; inflammation of the lungs, 18, and old age 6.
