Several prominent citizens of Norfolk called on Mr. Pepper, at the Hygeia Hotel at this place, yesterday afternoon, and tendered him their assistance and sympathy in his unfortunate situation.

freemen.
3. Resolved, That the opposition of President Johnson to the course of the Union made is in every respect unjority of Congress is in every respect un-warranted, and a defection from the cause of human rights and National progress.
