A VEBY SAD CASE.—In yesterday's BUL-LETIN, we noticed the solid of Mr. Jacob Koch. We learn to day some additional particulars. LUNAR ECLIPSE.-A lunar eclipse, which LIUNAR EXCLIPSE.—A JUNAR COLIPSE, Which was total, occurred last evening. It was the 2d of five solar and lunar eclipses for the current year. This was visible at New York, Poughteepsie, and in that region at one quarter before nice, but not complete for an hour afterward. It began in Philadelphia at 9.37, and the total eclipse occurred at 10.30. The shadow passed from the moon's disk a little before 2 o'clock. The sight is comparatively rare, and the streets were diled with persons watching its course. The next lunar eclipse, which will also be total, will occur on the 24th of September, and will be visible only in the Weet.


