A LOCOMOTIVE BREAKS THROUGH A BRIDGE-ENGINEER SCALDED AND FIRE-MAKERS KILLED. The through train from Washington to New York met with an accident in the Twenty-fourth Ward, about one o'clock this morning.

Robert Bingham, the fireman, was killed. He went down with the engine, and his head was almost torn from his body. His remains presented a shocking appearance.

The engine was a "shifter," and was only used to draw the train between the Falls of Schuylkill and Gray's Ferry. The bridge where the accident occurred was pretty well demolished.

The President has proclaimed the treaty with the Sans Arcs band of Dakota or Sioux Indians for the preservation of peace and their removal from the overland routes.

The New Jersey Senate. TRENTON, April 4th.—The Senate, by a vote of 8 to 11 to-day, again refused to go into joint session for the purpose of choosing a United States Senator.

SENATE.—Mr. Wilson (Mass.) introduced a bill for preserving the graves of Union soldiers from desecration, which was passed.

Mr. Foner (Kansas) introduced a bill for appointing a committee of managers for the National Military Academy, which was referred to the Committee on Education.

Mr. Clark (N. Y.) introduced a bill for the consideration of the plan of reconstruction recently submitted by him, and that his resolution on the subject of the reconstruction of the country for some definite plan of reconstruction at the hands of the Executive.
