

Execution in Cambria County.

Yesterday afternoon at one o'clock, in the jail yard at Ebensburg, was terminated, by the fulfillment of the law, which requires a life for a life, the terrible and widely-read Cambria County tragedy, by John Baptist Houser and Daniel Bowser, convicted in the December term of the Cambria County Court, and sentenced to death, were hanged for the murder, on the 7th of June last, of Polie Paul and Cassie Munday.

This was the first capital execution ever consummated in Cambria county.

In Croyle township, Cambria county, not far from Ebensburg, lived an old, married woman named Polie Paul, who was upwards of sixty years of age and had lived there for some forty years. She owned a small farm which she worked herself. She was exceedingly industrious and frugal, and by rigid economy had treasured up a considerable sum of gold and silver, supposed to amount to between three and four thousand dollars.

She was in the habit of going to the complete solitude, except that a young German girl, Cassie Munday, about fifteen years of age, lived with her to learn spinning.

One day about sunset on Thursday evening, June 7th, 1865, a little girl who was driving a cow from pasture near Polie's farm, heard cries from the house, and on going in, saw two men run around the barn and disappear. The child reported what she had seen, but no investigation was made until the next morning.

The two criminals, aside from their guilt in this particular case, were hardened and persistent wretches. They seemed always to have hunted in company, and were served to two terms together in the penitentiary. Houser was an ordinary looking man about thirty-eight years of age. He was born in Bavaria, and came to this country in 1835. In 1832 he formed an alliance with Bowser for the purpose of committing burglaries.

They were captured and sentenced to the penitentiary, from which they were released only a short time before the murder. His wife is now in jail, an idiotic vagrant.

Bowser was also a German, about thirty-five years of age, and was a native of Pennsylvania. He was a most wicked and vicious man, seeming to be a constitutional criminal. About ten days ago he committed suicide by opening a vein in his arm, but was discovered in time to save his life. He left a paper in the hands of his spiritual adviser which proved to be a partial confession of his crimes.

He was a firm believer in spiritualism and claimed to be haunted. He was once questioned after death by mercenary haunts of Hogue, Judge Taylor, and all others who had a hand in his conviction. After his death and failure his demoniac thoughts were materially. He lost his reckless, thoughtless appearance and became more changed, seeming to pay serious attention to what his spiritual adviser said to him.

Recently the preparations for the execution have been progressing rapidly. There was a report that the scaffold on which they were to suffer was the same on which Marshall and Frecke and Mrs. Grindler died. This was a mistake. It was on the same scaffold as the gallows here, but was entirely new.

The little yard built back of the jail, and was put in full sight of Houser's window, and he looked out and watched the preparations with evident interest.
