HUNT. irculation to a certain arbitrary standard. it practically asserts that the circulation of he national banks in Massachusetts shall Nos. 118 and 120 North Broad Street, be diminished 60 per cent.; the national banks in Connecticut shall be diminished 52 per cent.; and in Rhode Island 74 per Willow Street Wharf, Delaware Ave. ent.

The principle on which this reduction is based is not a correct one. One hundred and seventy-five thousand of the usual population of Obio or Illinois do not need a tenth part required by the manufacturing and commercial communities of Rhode Island. This bill is an amendment to section 21 of the present national currency act, and proposes to withdraw circulation from banks by reducing the ratio which it shall bear to capital. It will affect banks in all the States more or less by a certain fixed rate. The reduction is to be effected gradually as the circulation becomes worn and mutilated, and is returned for redemption. The amount by which the circulation is to be thus diminished approximates \$25,000,-000, and it is proposed in anticipation of this reduction to authorize the issue of circulation to banks in States that have re ceived the least proportionate amount of circulation, as it may be needed. The Secretary thinks it is important that solvent State banks should have an opportunity to become National banks, otherwise, by the operation of a law of the United States, they operation of a law of the United States, they will be compelled to wind up after the first day of July ciext, and that it is a matter of great importance that provision should be made to meet the wants of those States which have been in rebellion. Banking facilities are necessary to develope the industrial interests of the South, and to stimulate the production of those staples, to stimulate the production of those staples, which enter so largely into the financial in-terests of the country; at the same time, it would be wise policy to afford the people of that section an opportunity to become pecu-niarily interested in the successful mainte-nance of the Government of the United States. And inasmuch as Congress has as sumed entire control of the currency of the country, and to a very considerable extent of its banking interests, prohibiting the in-terference of State government, it would seem to be the plain duty of Congress to make adequate provision to work of the make adequate provision to meet the busi-ness wants of all sections of the country in the way of banking facilities.
