No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty or property without due process of law, nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal pro-Lection of the laws.
SEC. 2. Representatives shall be appor-

tioned among the several States, which may be included within this Union, according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each State, excluding Indians not staxed. But whenever in any State the elective franchise shall be denied to any portion of its male citizens not defined to any portion of its male cutzens now less than 21 years of age, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebel-lion or other crime, the basis of representa-tion in such State shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens not less than twenty-one years o

gress as such.
