[Special Despatch to the Bulletin.] WASHINGTON, May 1st, 1866 .- The Senate Finance Committee had a protracted ses-sion to-day, over the question of equailzing the National currency among the States, without coming to any conclusion. The matter was postponed until the next meeting. This Committee have not yet acted upon the nominations of Revenue Collectors from Pennsylvania. They have all been referred to a sub-committee who are investigating the facts in the matter. The Ship Canal scheme, which takes six millions out of the Treasury, is to be put

through to-day, if possible. The bill adding about eighty Paymasters to the regular Navy has finally passed.

HEADQUARTERS FENSYLVANIA MILI-TIA, HARRISBURG, May Ist, 1866.—General Orders, No. 56.—By a joint resolution of the Legislature approved May. 16th 1861, it was provided that the Go-vernors procure regimental standards for all the regiments formed or to be formed in Pansylvenie mony which shell he in in Pennsylvania, upon which shall be in-scribed the number of the regiment, and painted the arms of the Commonwealth; that all their standards, after the present unhappy rebellion is ended, shall be returned to the Governor that they may be carefully pre-served by the State, etc. On the fourth day of July next these regimental colors will be formally received by the Governor in the city of Philadelphia, in accordance with arrangements made by the committee appointed for the purpose, to be deposited rongst the archives of the com-monwealth, there to be sacredly preserved and cherished as emblems of the patriotism and devotion of her sons, dead and alive to liberty and the Union, the solemn and eloquent record of her high appreciation of their heroic ser-vices in the field as momentees of brave men and noble deeds. All Generals, Regimental and Company officers, and non-com-missioned officers and privates, of Pennsylvania, in service during the rebellion, are invited to take part in the ceremonies of
