WASHINGTON, May 3. - Judge Underwood, who is now here in conference with the Government, says that the Grand Jury which meets on Monday next, at Norfolk. will indict Jeff. Davis for treason. The other indictments which are pending against Lee, Johnston, Hunter and others, will be allowed to go over.

The Sloop-of-War Kearsarge — Yellow Fever on Board—The Vessel at Portu-gal.

[Correspondence N. Y. Times.]
LISBON, Portugal, Thursday, April 12,
1866.—The United States sloop-of-war Kearsarge arrived here, yesterday morning twenty days from Sierra Leone, coast of Africa. Before leaving that place the yellow fever broke out on board in its most fearful form, causing Commander Harrold to put to see with several sick on board. Before reaching this place seven officers and seven men died, and were buried at sea. The following are the names of the officers lost—Surgeon, Benjamin Vreeland; 2d Assistant Engineers, Joel H. Bullard, Joseph Hoops; Third Assistant Engineers, Richard F. Edwards, Elisha R. Tyson; Mates, Samuel Davis, Saml. Paine.

The names of the men I could not learn, The Kearsarge was immediately put in quarantine, and came to anchor off the lower part of the city. Several offers of medical assistance were made by the authorities on shore and the commanders of the different vessels in the harbor. A. P. A. Surgeon Henry Shaw, of the United States ship Ino being on board at the time, immediately repaired on board the Kearsarge, where he remained quarantined with that
