The Gas Works Investigation.—The THE GAS WORKS INVESTIGATION.—The Committee of Select Council appointed to investigate the affairs of the Philadelphia Gas Works held a meeting last evening. Joseph Manuel, Esq., Chiel Engineer of the Gas Works, was present by request of the Committee, but he refused to be sworn or to testify. He stated that a person, who was a candidate for the position that he now holds, had entered into a conspiracy to injure him. He (Mr. Manuel) did not recognize the authority, but was amenable to the Board of Prustees of the Gas Works, and any questions to be asked of him must first be submitted to the Board, and by them submitted to him, to whom alone he was responsible. As he was not an officer of a department of the city, he dealed the right of the Committee to hold him to accountability. At the proper time and place, and in a proper manner, he would bring those conspiring against him before the proper tribunal. He was ready at all times to answer the Trustees, or any one that the might appoint.


