Congress might as well refuse to ap-propriate money to pay the salary of the President as to refuse to pay the salaries of officers appointed by the President. He wished his motion to lie on the table until a bill now in course of preparation in re-lation to appointments was presented to the Senate.

Mr. Stevens (Pa.) moved to amend by adding a section extending, for two years, the time for commencing and completing the Northern Pacific Railroad, and all its several sections. The amendment was agreed to, and the joint resolution, as amended, was passed.

At 4½ o'clock the House adjourned.

From The Canadian Capital. OTTOWA, May 3.—A grand reception was given last evening to Governor-General Lord Monck, on the occasion of his arriving here to take up his permanent residence It was a public holiday. Triumphal arches were erected, and the volunteers, firemen and citizens turned out to meet the Governor upon his arrival. The Mayor read an address of welcome, and pledged the city of Ottowa, in common with the rest of the peo-ple of Canada, to defend their rights and

liberties and a British connection. The Governor replied in a stirring speech, and said that the armed demonstration which circumstances had compelled the Provinces to make were not without benefit They had given vigor to the national life in British America, which the people were both able and willing to defend. The same feeling in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick gives an earnest of increased vi-tality from the political Union, which he confidently expected would soon take place. The Home Government had signified its unqualified approbation of the measures for the defence of the Provinces, and had pro-mised to send all the reinforcements that may be asked for.
