#### THE LOTTERY POLICY BUSINESS. How it is Carried on—How Drawings are

John Morrissey, Ben Wood, and others. [From To-day's New York Tribune.]

A Mr. Scott, of New Jersey. having been bitten to the tune of some \$40,000, in the purchase of lottery tickets, and ha ing, as he avers discovered, though at a heavy price, all the ropes and tricks of the trade, has started in an effort not only to recover his meney, but to punish those ergaged in the business. Some two weeks ago an order of arrest was obtained and served on some of the principal parties engaged in an action of the "apper or Court of this State, and on Wednesday an application was made to Judge Shipman of the U. S. Circuit Court, fo an order of arrest aga not Benj. Wood, John Morrissey, Wm. 8. Simmons, David S. Read, Jacob Banch and Lewis Davis. The Court granted the usual 'apias, the declaration being in tres pass for 'fraudulently obtaining from said plaintiff moneys for lottery tickets and policy slips to his damage, \$30,000." In the affidavit on which the capias was granted the plaintiff swears that early in the year 1853 he commenced the practice of nurchasing lottery tickets, and also of lottery policy slips, which p. riported to be decided by the drawing of certain lotteries located in the State of Re attacky, that he purchased said lottery tickets and oltery policy slips of various lottery and policy venders in the city of New York, and that he continued such purchases of said slips and tickets from said year down to the date of this affidavit; that the various venders from whom he bought the same were severally alleged to be the agnits of the owners and managers of said Kentucky lotteries, and it was represented to deponent in the interest and on behalf of said managers; that the drawings by which said tickets and policy slips were to be decided would be lawfully and fairly drawn, and when drawn, fairly applied to the numbers on said slips and tickets.
