COMPARATIVE MORTALITY OF OFFICERS AND MEN.

Table comparing mortality rates between officers and men in the Army and Navy. Columns include Category, Officers, and Men.

Of the grand total of deaths from all causes in the Army and Navy, four hundred and twenty-two died in action and of wounds, one hundred and fifty-seven officers of the regular army, and six thousand and six hundred and thirty-two of the volunteers.

From this, it appears first, that killed in battle and of wounds, there was one officer to every eighteen enlisted men, showing a greater suffering from the chances of battle of officers, who, with full ranks, constitute about a twenty-fifth part of the army, than of enlisted men.

Their food is generally better in quality and more varied in kind. They are not so crowded together in barracks, and are therefore less subject to contagious and epidemic diseases. They have superior advantages in regard to personal cleanliness.

As prizes for merit, they are generally given more liberally. Another favoring and by no means less potent cause of a psychological nature, is the superior elasticity of mind and the confidence in which the man is given to a man by investing him with a commission and its accompanying authority, responsibility, and hopes of advancement.

EXTRAORDINARY MORTALITY FROM DISEASE AMONG COLORED TROOPS. A very noteworthy feature of the above tables is the extraordinary mortality among the colored troops from disease in action.

It is seen that, while but two thousand nine hundred and ninety-seven died in action among the white troops, the enormous large number of twenty-three thousand and one hundred and one died of disease.

Arranging the States in groups, the average proportion is in the New England States, 14.76; in the Middle States, 31.79; in the Western States, 38.81, and in the Border States, 52.82.

It appears from the foregoing that, as regards the mortality from battle ranged highest in the Northern States, both of the Eastern and Western. The high ratio of New England, 14.76, corresponds to that of Iowa, 14.76, of Michigan, 14.82, and of Wisconsin, 14.82.

With the States in groups, we have an average proportion for the New England States of 14.76; Middle States, 31.79; Western States, 38.81, and Border States, 52.82.

The variations of mortality from disease in part from the nature of the respective services; required of troops drawn from different localities.

An undue proportion of New England troops was used in the unhealthy Atlantic and Gulf States of the South, and this circumstance may be attributed in a measure to the fact that 70.45 per cent of the men from the Eastern States died of disease.

From the foregoing table it appears, that of the total number of troops reduced to the three years' standard, furnished by the several States, there was lost by death in action, from disease, and from wounds, 21,84 before the general ratio of Virginia was a healthier field of service than the bottom of the Tennessee or the lowlands of Louisiana, Mississippi and South Carolina, and it cannot be denied, moreover, that the Army of the Potomac was always by far the best provided of all our large armies.

Comparing the relative mortality from all causes in the regular forces and volunteers, we find the following ratios and proportions per thousand men furnished (the regular army numbered about 67,000 officers and men during the war):
