It is stated that an Austrian despatch delivered at Berlin on the 26th, announces that Austria had not immediately began to disarm, on account of fresh implications having arisen with Italy. The semi-official Norde Deutsch Zeitung, of the 26th, says:

Increased armament of Austria forbids the Increased armament of Austria forbids the disarmament of the Prussian forces. Should Austria attack Italy, Prussia could not consent to see the Italian army disabled. Austria must reduce her establishment to a peace footing on Italian, as well as Prussian frontiers, or must otherwise expect an infronteract of Prussian armament. crease of Prussian armament.

A Vienna telegram says:—The Austrian

response to the Prussian note of the 21st acknowledges with satisfaction its conciliatory character; pointing out, however, virtually, that Austria did not arm, but only effected certain movements of troops as evidence of the peaceful aspect which the relations between the two great German powers had assumed. Austria had made arrangements for a retrograde movement of her forces concentrated in Bohemia, and officially communicates such arrangements to Prussia.


