From Washington.
New York, May 10.—[The statement that Secretary Seward had gone to New York, untrue. He is at the State Department to-day.]

In anticipation of the passage of the new thirty day five per cent loan, Jay Cooke to-day received an order from New York for two hundred thousand dollars, from a private investor.

The Senate Commerce Committee to-day reported favorably upon the nomination of Mr. Smythe as the New York Collector.

A British Vessel Used by Two Fenians.
New York, May 10.—Capt. McBride, of the British schooner *Wentworth*, from Windsor to this port, reports that on the 21st inst. his vessel was seized off Grand Menan by a party of six men, who named themselves as Fenians. They acted in a very orderly manner, doing no damage either to the vessel or crew. After they left Capt. McBride was ordered and proceeded on his voyage.

Explosion of a Shell—Loss of Life.
Boston, May 10.—The iron-clad *Davies & Farnum*, at Waltham, yesterday afternoon, a shell which had been purchased for old iron, exploded, instantly killing Wm. H. Howard, and two boys named O'Brien and Flynn. The explosion wounded Mr. Bean, the foreman of the foundry, and Mr. McFarland, a workman. Mr. Howard was formerly a captain in the 25th Massachusetts Regiment, and was a brave and good officer.

Boston, May 10.—The U. S. iron-clad Miantonomah, company with the U. S. steamer *Augusta*, from New York for Halifax, passed Highland Light, Cape Cod, at 2 o'clock on Tuesday afternoon.
