They are a nuisance calling loudly and imperatively for vigorous and prompt abatement,"

THE WORE NUISANCE.—The measuring THE WORE NUISANCE.—The measuring. worm, so destructive to the shade trees and so annuy ing to the people, has alreacy begun to make its appearance for the season, and the prospect now is that we shall have them in greater abundance this year than everbefore. They may be found upon almost every leaf of the maple, linden and other trees, and they are already committing their usual deprecations, at present they are very small—less than a quarter of an inch in length, and about the thickness. If cotton thread, Upon some of the leaves there will not be more than one or two; upon others a half dozen of them, and their presence can easily be discovered by the holes where they have eaten through the leaf. They will now grow rapidly, and in a short time will be seen not only stripping some trees entirely of the r foliage, but crawling about everywhere and lighting upon everybody.

be seen not only stripping some trees entirely of the rollege, but crawling about everywhere and lighting upon everybody.

How these little creatures came upon the leaves is an interesting question to decide. The theory that they hatch out from clusters of eggs tound upon the under side of the small branches is clearly incorrect, for the worms are found upon the tip ends of limbs where there has not been the least appearance of eggs of any kind, and that they ever crawled there, is certainly impossible. Some one, perhaps, can enlighten us ut on the subject. It may be that the millers deposit their eggs along the smaller branches, where they cannot be discovered by the naked eye; or what is more probable, they are placed at the root of the leaf, so that when the bud puts out the following year, the eggs come out and hatch. A few days ago, the worms were hardly the size of a gnat, and yet they were upon the tender leaves feeding themselves. The only remedy for the eyil, we can now suggest it for eyery man to attend to his own trees. There may not be much success in shaking off the worms in their present size; but something may be done, and a little care every merning for a week or so, will do much in the way of abating the nulsance.
