WASHINGTON, May 12th.—The exhibit of Mr. Wells, Special Tax Commissioner, to the Ways and Means Committee shows that the aggregate of the treasury receipts for the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1866, will be five hundred and eleven million dollars. Congress intends to reduce this amount one hundred million, principally by freeing labor from taxation.

The Senate portion of the Reconstruction Committee, favor the striking out of the third section of the Constitutional Amendment, and substituting one forever excluding certain class of rebels from holding Federal positions.

The Way and Means Committee are engaged on the Tariff bill, and will continue its consideration from day to day until it is disposed of. There will be a considerable increase of duties all around.
