Ninth. At the conclusion of the ceremony

the flags shall be escorted to the hall from whence they were brought, where they will be kept until returned to Harrisburg and deposited in the archives of the Common Tenth. The committee, in order to carry

Interesting Centennial Anniversary—Impressive Ceremonies at Zion Lutheran Church.

The centennial anniversary of that old Philadelphia landmark, the Zion Lutheran Church, situated at the southeast corner of

Fourth and Cherry streets, took place yes-The time-honored edifice was beautifully and appropriately decorated on the interesting occasion. A large transparency, which was brilliantly illuminated in the evening, occupied a conspicuous position directly in

occupied a conspicuous position directly in the rear of the pulpit. It contained portraits of Rev. Mr. Demme, and Rev. Mr. Muhlenburgh, whose names are intimately associated with Zion Church. The figures "1766" and "1866" were suspended in circular wreaths from either side of the transparency, and it also contained an inscription in the German language having reference to the centennial celebration. The American and German flags drooped gracefully from either side of the transparency. The pulpit was tastefully ornamented, and was surmounted with a choice collection of fragrant flowers and plants, which presented a very striking appearance. As the church is not furnished with gas fixtures, it was lighted last evening by means of three elaborate chandeliers suspended from the ceiling, and containing wax tapers. Hundreds of these tapers were distributed around the borate chandeliers suspended from the ceiling, and containing wax tapers. Hundreds of these tapers were distributed around the body of the church, giving a flood of light nearly equal to gas. Wreaths of evergreen were placed all around the spacious galleries, each containing the name of a former pastor of the church. From the chandeliers there drooped in graceful style, heavy hangings of evergreen, which stretched across the entire interior. Evergreens were also entwined around the numerous pillars also entwined around the numerous pillars that support the gallery. The decorations generally were in excellent taste, and the

church presented quite a picturesque appearance. pearance; The singing during the day and evening was performed by the united choirs of the Zion, St. Michael's and St. Paul's Lutheran churches, and was given with remarkably fine effect. The order of exercises during the day and evening were as follows: In the norning an excellent sermon was delivered by Rev. G. P. Krotel, Pastor of St. Mary's Lutheran Church, Spring Garden street; the singing was accompanied by an excellent orchestra. The afternoon was appropriated by the children connected with the different

The spacious building, one of the largest churches internally in the country, was crowded during the day and evening to its utmost capacity, and the ceremonies were listened to with the greatest interest and attention. In the evening bundreds were tention. In the evening, hundreds were turned away, unable to gain admission.

The corner-stone of Zion Church was laid on the 16th of May, 1766, and the dedication took place June 29th, 1769. In November, 1777, it was taken possession of by the British, who used it as a hospital until the 28th of June, 1778, when the city was evacuated by the English troops. After some necessary alterations in the interior, the church was again dedicated to Divine service, September 22, 1782. The interior of the structure was entirely destroyed by fire on the 29th of December, 1794, but it was soon rebuilt in November, 1796, and was dedicated with appropriate ceremonies. During the yellow rever epidemics of 1796 and 1798, nearly a thousand members of the congregation were carried off. The impressive funeral services in memory of Washington ordered by Congress, took place in the build ing in December, 1799, and a short time afterwards, the ceremonies of the Grand Lodge of Masons of this State, in comme moration of the same event, also occurred there, and the church remained heavily draped in mourning until the following Easter. To-day and to-morrow the church
