"That all persons who, while in the militripically persons who, which in the lime of duty, shall have lost the sight of both eyes, or lost both hands, or been permanently and totally disabled in the same, or otherwise so permanently disabled as to render them utterly helpless, or so nearly so as to require the constant personal aid and attendance of another person, shall be entitled to a pension of twenty-five dolhas per month, and all persons who, under like circumstances, shall have lost both feet, or one hand and one foot, or been totally and permanently disabled in the same, or otherwise so disabled as to be incapacitated; for performing any manual labor, but not so much as to require con-stant personal aid and attention, shall be entitled to a pension of twenty dollars per menth; and all persons who, under like circumstances, shall have lost one hand or one foot, or been totally and permanently disabled in the same, or otherwise so disabled as to materially interfere with the performance of manual labor, without wholly incapacitating them therefor, shall be entitled to a pension of fifteen dollars per

The bill further annuls all sales or transfers of right or interest in any pension which has been or may be granted; provides punishment in case of fraud; rep section 1 of the act of March 3d, 1865, supple mentary to previous Pension acts; pro that if any person entitled to invalid pensions has died since March 4th, 1861, or may hereafter die, pending an application, afte proof has been completed, leaving no widow or child under 16 years of age, his next heirs shall be entitled to the accrued pension; gives pensions to commissioned officers, according to rank, who have died or may die, or be disabled in the line of duty before being mustered out, excepting such officers as have wilfully neglected or refused to be mustered out; includes officers and men absent or on sick leave; extends the time of service until actual discharge or disbandment of the organization provides that where a widow, entitled to pension, has abandoned her minor child, or is unfit to have care of the same, she shal not be allowed the pension until the child reaches the age of sixteen, the child being pensioned in the meantime; and de clares that nothing in this or other acts shall be construed so as to entitle any person to more than one pension at the same time.

lowing amendment as an additional section and it was adopted: SEC. 13. And be it further enacted. That the fourteenth section of an act entitled "An act supplementary to an act entitled an ac to grant pensions, approved July 14th, 1862," approved July 4th; 1864, be and the same is hereby repealed, and that the widows and children of colored soldiers and sailors who have been or may be hereafter killed, or who have died or may hereafter die of wounds received or of disease contracted in the military or naval service of the United States, and in the line of duty, shall be entitled to receive the pensions, bounty, and back pay provided by law, without other evidence of marriage than proof satisfactory to the Commissioner of Pensions that the parties had habitually recognized each other as man and wife, and lived together as such for a definite period, not less than two years next preceding the enlistment of the man; and the children born of any marriage so proved, shall be deemed and taken to be the children of the soldier of

Convention re-assembled to-day, Hon. John M. Botts in the chair, when Mr. Hill offered the following:

Resolved, That accepting as the settled policy of this convention the resolutions and reports agreed upon, we organize ourselves into a permanent political organization.

selves into a permanent political organiza-tion, to be known as the Union Republican party of Virginia, Resolved, That a State Committee con-sisting of nine members, be appointed by the convention, to act until the meeting of the next annual convention of this party. Resolved, That the State Central Commit-tee be authorized to proceed as soon as in their judgment, it be deemed advisable, in their judgment, it be deemed advisable, in forming county ceatral committees in each county of the State, the members of each county committee to be appointed for the first year by the State Central Committee, and afterwards by the county convention.

Resolved, That the State Central Committee be invested exclusively with the power to call State conventions of the party, and the County Central Committee be invested.

the County Central Committee be invested exclusively with the power to call county conventions of the party. were adonted.

The following were reported by the Committee on Resolutions:
Resolved, That while we rejoice that both the executive and legislative branches of the National Government desire the establishment of the great principle of equality of civil and political rights, we regret that they differ in opinion as to the legitimate means of gaining the same end, and we, whose interests are so much affected by this question, deem if our duty not to remain silent. Therefore, as we are unable by any representation in Congress to take part in he national councils, we will do all we can to bring about the mutual wish of the President and Congress by initiating State action in favor of impartial qualified suffrage,

tion in favor of impartial qualified surrage, which, in our opinion, is one of the requisites of a republican form of government.

Resolved, That the accountability of both the legislative and executive branches of the government of a State to the whole peo-ple is the only safeguard against the enacting of partial and unjust laws, and the only sure protection against tyranny and oppression in the execution of all laws, so that if any considerable portion of the community is denied a voice in the elections, that por-tion of the people will be denied such perfect protection as ought to exist in the rights

f person and property.

Resolved, That the doctrine of the right of ecession was the principal issue of the late civil war, and that no policy of reconstruc-tion is safe which does not provide against the possibility of that issue arising again.

Resolved, That while the late rebels affect to accept the situation, they not only hold the same opinions still in regard to that is-sue, but openly advocate their views in that respect as the basis of party action in the future, we believe for the purpose of accomplishing with votes what they have failed to accomplish with the bayonet.

Resolved, That the chairman of this convention be authorized to appoint a committee of five or eight persons, whose duty it shall be to visit the President to ascertain his feelings with reference to the objects and action of this convention, and that this committee be requested to get from the Presi-

action. Resolved. That the Union Republican party of Virginia, believing that knowledge is power, and that an enlightened and virtuous people can never be enslaved and that the maintenance and perpetuation of republican institutions depends mainly upon the education of the masses of the eople, therefore we are in favor of a system

of free schools, whereby universal education may be disseminated.

The report is signed by Geo. Tucker, of Alexandria; G. J. King, of Frederick; J. H. Clements, of Portsmouth: P. Dudley, of Henrico; W. R. Smith, of Frederick; J. W. Beemer, of Clark; G. W. Dilliard, of Albemarle: John Haxhurst, of Fairfax.

I,A. B., do solemnly swear that I am now. and ever have been, an enemy to the so-called Southern Confederacy, or to any reto the Government of the United States.

these resolutions step beyond Congress.

Mr. Tucker, of Alexandria, argued that the elective franchise should in justice be given to the negroes, and that there was not a better way in which to punish the rebels than to make the colored more their carella. a better way in which to punish the repeix than to make the colored men their equals. Mr. Pollock, of Frederick, objected to the resolutions because they were of the milk-and-water kind, and expressed him-self as a friend to Congress. The rebels should be deprived entirely of the right of

suffrage.

After further debate the resolutions were recommitted, and after being revised were adopted by a vote of 38 to 32. adopted by a vote of 38 to 32.

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
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
