CITY BULLETIN.

COMFORTABLE CARS.—The Thirteenth and Fifteenth Streets Railway Company is making many excellent improvements. Five new cars were placed upon the line a few days ago, which are decidedly superior in elegance and comfort to the cars of any other passenger railway in Philadelphia. Since the accession of Mr. Megargee to the Presidency of the road, a marked improve-ment has taken place in all its appoint-ments. He has stocked the road with a supply of good horses; has put upon the line several new cars; and the faces of those conductors who were formerly noted for their disgusting appearance and their disobliging tempers, are seen no more. The Thirteenth and Fifteenth is now a first-class road.

CITY MORTALITY.—The number of interments in the city during the past week was 259 against 258 the same period last year. Of the whole number 128 were adults and 131 children—78 being under one year of age. 121 were males, 138 females, 61 boys and 70 girls. The greatest number of deaths occurred in the Nineteenth Ward, being 21, and the smallest number in the Twelfth Ward, where only one was reported. The princips causes of death were congestion of the brain. ; congestion of the lungs, 7; consumption 37; convulsions, 11; disease of the heart, 8; debility, 10; typhus fever, 10; inflammation of the lungs, 29; old age, 9.

The Surgeon-General states that the Saterlee Hospital, South Street Hospital and Christian street Hospital, are still retained by the Quartermaster's Department, and "should any emergency arise requiring it, the equipment for these hospitals can be furnished by the Medical Department of the army at cost prices.

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
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
