He was careful not to term them negotiations, and frankly stated that he could not hold out a hope that they would terminate in peace, although England would do her best to bring about such a result.

France would have been glad to see such an arrangement effected, but as it did not meet the approva of the other Powers, the French Cabinet could not think of imposing its opinion upon

the other European Governments."

The Constitutionnel proceeds to express a wish that the Principalities should listen to the wise counsels of France, and return to that prudent attitude which can alone save them from painful emergencies.

Of these, 2,192 were removed by owners of different premises.
