But he evidently was in no mood to follow out this line of thought. With a last appeal for concession and a last protest against delay, he urged the passage of the Amendment and left it to the House. ### PENNSYLVANIA FINANCES.

The Treasury of Pennsylvania is about to receive a handsome addition to its funds by the allowance by the United States of a claim of about three quarters of a million of dollars paid by the State to the militia called out to repel rebel invasion. Even with this extraordinary outlay, and with other heavy expenses incident to the war, there was a steady reduction of the State debt during the period, and now this repayment by the United States will furnish funds nearly sufficient to pay the August interest, leaving the other accumulations to go into the sinking fund for an extinguishment of a part of the principal. A bright future is open for Pennsylvania. Her population, resources and revenue are increasing rapidly, and her debt is diminishing rapidly. 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
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
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
