From Washington.

WASHINGTON, June 18.—Senator Fessenden is in his seat, and will report the Tax bill to-day. They have added between five and six hundred amendments to it, many of them very important.

Voluntions despatches were read at the State Department to-day from our Ministers to England and France. War is regarded as inevitable and cannot long be postponed.

The Ways and Means Committee have nearly completed the tariff bill. The Senate Military Committee have postponed until next December the House bill fixing the pay of officers of the army.

Worcester, Mass., June 18th.—The express freight train from Norwich this morning ran into a freight car at Auburn, which had been blown by the wind from a turnout into the main track. The engine and nine cars were thrown off the track, and the engineer had his leg broken.

The Petroleum and Venango County Banks. HARRISBURG, June 18.—It is necessary to state for the protection of stockholders of the Petroleum and Venango county Banks, that sufficient securities remain in the hands of the Auditor General to redeem every dollar of the circulating medium of these banks.

The suits pending in reference to the removal of bonds from the Auditor General's office, will only effect depositors in those institutions. Several of the parties implicated in the alleged frauds in this connection, were arrested in Venango county, but admitted to bail by an Alderman in that region in a very small amount.

Cholera in Baltimore. BALTIMORE, June 18.—A fatal case of cholera occurred here yesterday afternoon. The victim was a gentleman who arrived by Saturday night's train. He died about four o'clock in the afternoon at one of our infirmaries. The disease was no doubt contracted in New York.

Mail Robbery. NEWARK, N. J., June 18th.—Foster M. Dunn, a clerk in the Post Office in this city, was arrested on Saturday on a charge of robbing the mails, and has confessed his guilt. Money and letters were found on his person.

The European Squadron. HALIFAX, June 18.—The U. S. gunboats Augusta and Assuolot, and monitor Miantonomah sailed from St. Johns, N. B., on the 15th inst. for Queenstown. The Assuolot, when off the narrows ran into and sank the brig Selina.

The China below Halifax. HALIFAX, June 18.—The steamship China, below this port, detained by the fog. Her advice as to the 9th and 10th insts., and will be telegraphed as soon as she arrives up.

From New Orleans. NEW ORLEANS, June 17th.—The steamers Huntsville, Stevedore and Mariposa have sailed for New York.

Storm at Cleveland. CLEVELAND, Ohio, June 18th.—The barge Arabia, of Port Burwell, Canada, was wrecked on the piles here last night. Captain Eakin, master McDermott and wife, and two sailors were lost. The schooner Alton Grover, of Toronto, was totally wrecked here last night.

FATHER POINT, June 18.—The steamship Peruvian, from Liverpool on the 7th, and Londonderry on the 8th inst., has passed this point.

The steamships Virginia, Bavaria and Java had arrived out.

The Prussian troops entered Holstein on the 7th.

The Austrians were concentrating at Altona, where a collision is expected.

These movements are regarded as a virtual commencement of the war.

In the British House of Commons the opposition attempted a surprise on the Government by moving a postponement of the Franchise clause in the Reform bill, but were defeated by a majority of 77 for the Government. Walpole's amendment was

also rejected, the Government majority being 74.

Corros.—The sales of the week amounted to 71,000 bales. The market opened buoyant with an advance which was lost and closed at a decline of 1/4d on the week.

Sales to speculators 6,600 bales and to exporters 9,600 bales. Orleans middlings was quoted at 13 1/2d.

The sales on Friday amounted to 15,000 bales, the market closing buoyant, with an advance of 1/4d., caused by advices per the steamer Java.

The Death of Hon. Lewis Cass. WASHINGTON June 18, 1866.—The following was issued this morning:

DEPARTMENT OF STATE, WASHINGTON, June 18, 1866.—The President directs the undersigned to perform the painful duty of announcing to the people of the United States, that Lewis Cass, distinguished not more by faithful service in varied public trusts than by exalted patriotism at a recent period of political discord, departed this life at 4 o'clock yesterday morning.

The several Executive departments of the Government will cause appropriate honors to be rendered to the memory of the deceased at home and abroad, wherever the National name and authority are acknowledged. [Signed] W. H. SEWARD.

CHARGED WITH ROBBERY.—A colored man, named Clarence Miller, was brought to the city from New York, last night, and was locked up in the Fifth District Police Station upon the charge of robbing a man named John Johnson, who was a colored man from the country, stopped at the boarding-house of Mrs. Johnson, also colored, at DuPont and Locust streets, and the next morning missed their carryer yesterday. A negro, named George Betz, was arrested, and declared to Lieut. Connelly that he had seen the man and the goods, upon this statement, and other evidence, Miller was arrested in New York.

MUCH ADO ABOUT NOTHING.—Last night about twelve o'clock an individual residing on Tenth street, below Shippen, raised the alarm by shouting and commencing springing a rattle very furiously. The whole neighborhood became excited in a few minutes. Windows were raised and night-caps were pulled off. A policeman was sent out on the scene, and after some delay was admitted by the occupant, who declared that there were robbers about. A search was made, but no goods were found, and in the last resort a cat making a noise in the endeavor to get out.

ATTEMPTED BURGLARY.—Wm. Debois John Miller and Charles Norwood were before the Police Court on the charge of attempted burglary. Early yesterday morning they were watched by Officer Shields, of the Twentieth Ward, and when they were discovered in an attempt to effect an entrance into a house on Sixth street, above Parrish, by using pickers, Shields sprang his rattle and the men succeeded in capturing the party. The accused were committed for a further hearing.

THEIR DEPREDACTIONS.—The three young men who were arrested in the Twentieth Ward on suspicion of burglary, and who has been ascertained have been engaged in committing depredations upon the farm houses near Gray's Ferry, and disposing of their eggs, &c., to the soldiers encamped near the Arsenal. A room in an old house near Gray's Ferry was used as a receptacle for the stolen articles. Several fine pieces of the kind used by the burglars were found. FIRE IN FRANKFORD.—On Saturday evening, about eight o'clock, a fire occurred in a barn and stable on the Whiteleaf Estate, near Frankford, owned by John Green, in Frankford. The total loss was about \$1,700, no insurance.

ROBBERY.—The house of Wm. Smedley, in the Nineteenth Ward, was entered this morning about three o'clock by forcing open a back window. About 100 cigars were stolen.

QUARTER SESSIONS.—Judge Peirce, Michael Doyle was convicted of a charge of assault and battery upon his wife, Mrs. William Warnley, colored, was convicted of a charge of committing an outrage upon the person of a female.

ROBERT PERING was convicted of a charge of stealing 25 yards of carpet. Thomas Clark was convicted of a charge of stealing a set of harness.

JOHN HOLLOWAY was charged with stealing a half pound of tobacco, and a pair of shoes, the whole valued at thirty cents. The prosecutor failed to appear, and the bill was dismissed and a verdict of not guilty rendered.

JOSEPH BYERS was convicted of a charge of larceny. MARY DUFF was charged with stealing \$20. The prosecutrix alleged that she was counting money while sitting on a steamboat at Chestnut street, when the defendant came on board with fruit to sell. She stopped at the feet of the prosecutrix and picked up something. Shortly afterwards \$20 was missing, and the defendant was arrested on the charge of stealing the amount. Jury out.
