With help or without it, I shall soon again stand on Anabuc's soil, bearing aloft that banner that I planted on the walls of Vera Cruz, when I drove the French from my land in '39, and my voice shall now, as then, be strong enough to raise even the dead, my former companions, from their graves; they will help me to free Mexico again, or will drag me down to deplore with me the ruin of my country.



Mine Hill Railroad sold at 57; Catawissa Railroad Preferred at 32; Lehigh Valley Railroad at 64%, and Northern Central Railroad at 45%. 129% was bid for Camden and Amboy Railroad; 59% for Germantown Railroad; 39% for North Pennsylvania Railroad; 42 for Elmira Railroad Preferred 20 for the Common stock, and 33 for Philadelphia and Erie Bailroad. Canal stocks were but little inquired after. Lehigh Navigation sold at 59. 37% was bld for Schuylkill Navigation Preferred. 28½ for the Common stock. Bank shares were without quotable change, Passenger Railway securities were dull. 88% was bid for Second and Third Streets; 71 for West Philadelphia; 37 for Spruce and Pine Streets; 30 for Green and Coates Streets; 28 for Girard College; 17% for Hestonville, and 9 for Seventeenth and Nineteenth Streets.






