

NEW PUBLICATIONS.

Certain persons in Washington and elsewhere have, for a long time, been acting as agents for procuring pardons, and some of the written letters from the South claiming that they have peculiar advantages and influence for obtaining the Executive clemency.

Applications for pardons for persons in the Southern States, are with the accompanying documents, referred to the Attorney-General, on whose report the President decides, and in every case it is determined favorably.

The official document of pardon is issued from the State Department, and is not prepared, there being no necessity for ever for applicants to employ agents to facilitate the business, as they have no influence in the premises.

Appointments by the President. The following appointments of internal revenue officers have been made: Quincy D. Whitman, assessor for the Sixth district of Illinois.

PARDONS.—The President has directed the pardons of the following persons: James Powers, convicted at the December term of 1865 of the United States Circuit Court for the Southern District of Ohio of presenting for payment false claims against the United States, and sentenced to one year's imprisonment.
