The ratification was exchanged on the 12th, at Vienna The Italians have completely occupied Peschiera, Mantua and Borgoforte. At the request of Gen. Revel all the political prisoners in Venice were set at liberty

on the 11th;

A large number of arrests are reported to have been made at Palermo of prisoners compromised by the recent disturbances.

The Italian Senate has been convoked, and the latter account of the prisoners of the prison is holding several sessions for the trial of Admiral Persano.

It has been officially stated that the loss

of the Italian troops at Palermo, during the riots, amounted to three hundred and sixtysix killed and wounded.

"A despatch dated Baltimore, Md., October 9th, has been received here from the Council of seven archbishops and four bishops, in which they salute the Pope and express wishes for the preservation of the ancient rights of the Holy See."

The Emperor has returned to Vienna from Ischid. and was to satout for a tour through

Ischid, and was to set out for a tour through Bohemia in a few days. Prior to his departure the Hungarian Diet was to be convoked and an Imperial protest issued, announcing that as soon as negotiations with the Diet are brought to a satisfactory conclusion the Hungarian ministry will be formed.

The Prussian Cabinetaddressed representations to Austria in reference to the arrest, by the Austrian authorities at Altfredick, of by the Austrian authorities at Altfredick, of 800 Hungarians, who formed a portion of the former Prusso-Hungarian legion. Austria, in a reply by telegraph, announced that the necessary steps nad been taken for carrying out the guarantees contained in the peace treaty, and no impediment would be offered by the Austrian authorities to the return of members of the legion to their homes.

The great annual rifle meeting was progressing with much spirit and enthusiasm at Brussels. Large numbers of English volunteers were present.

Advices from Candia continue to indicate that the revolution is losing its serious character, and the public mind is becoming apeased. It was said that the leaders of the insur-

gents had sent a deputation to Lirith Pasha offering to enter into negotiations for sub-mission, on condition that the conferences on the subject should take place in the presence of France, England and Prussia, and the condition had been accepted.

There were already 30,000 Turkish troops of line in Epirus and Thessaly, and further

reinforcements were to be sent. A rising of the Christians of these districts was considered imminent.

Buffale Hunting—An Exciting Sport.
A correspondent of the Cincinnati Commercial writes from the plains:

Yesterday we had another handsome run with the buffalo, starting two large bulls quite close to the road. To look at them running you would suppose their speed was contemptable. Their contemptations of the running was a suppose their speed was contemptation. contemptible. Their gait is ungainly, resembling more nearly the lope of a pig than that of any animal I can recall. With their noses close to the ground, they keep steadily on, and only began to run their best when you expect to see them tire out. You change your mind as to their speed when you try one with your horse at his best speed. The embarrassments of an amateur buffalo hunter are varied, and not limited in number contemptible. Their gait is ungainly, reter are varied, and not limited in number. As a general thing, his horse objects to the buffalo—dislike him, in short, and is with difficulty persuaded to face him, although he may follow well enough. The moment the buffalo turns, your horse is off, and it may be well for you to look that you are not off too. Indeed, with half a dozen bullets in him, his awful drapery of shaggy hair, eyes glaring, blood dripping from his jaws, the buffalo bull is not a pleasant object for a horse to look upon, much less to get near. He is full of fight, and shows it while he has power left to move a muscle. ter are varied, and not limited in number. while he has power left to move a muscle Well, our two bulls were run down and forty minutes. One of them was a noble specimen, some twelve years old, very large, specimen, some twelve years old, very large, measuring nine feet in length and six in height. When he turned at bay, he was a rraly grand spectacle. With such horses as the Indians have the sport is much finer. The horse knows the buffalo nearly as well as his rider, and will dash up at full speed close to his side, giving the hunter all the time needed to put his shot in the desired place—just behind the shoulder. It certainly is as glorious and exhibitating a sport as anything in hunting can be, for even the fresh, untrained horses, when recovered from their first terror, enter into the sport,

and fairly tremble with the excitement. To-day we had another buffalo hunt of a singular description. Our camp is situated on the declivity of a bill looking south toward the Arkansas. About half an hour before sunset, some one near me cried out "buffalo," and although I supme cried out "Dunaio," and although I sup-posed it to be a joke, I looked up, and sure enough, there was a buffalo just just below the crest of the hill, coming towards us. It stopped, turned, looked bewildered for a moment, and began to run back. Mean-time half a dozen rifles and revolvers were time half a dozen rifles and revolvers were grasped, and by dint of heading off and wounding it, the animal was actually run down and shot by half a dozen men on foot. It was a young buffalo cow. Poor, misguided, giddy thing. Strayed from its herd, it was, doubtless, endeavoring to make its way across the river, to which its instinct was unerringly guiding it,"

JOHN BROWN'S TRACT.—Many of those who are familiar with the extensive tract of who are familiar with the extensive tract of wild country in northern New York, known as John Brown's Tract, have the name erroneously associated with the leader in the Virginia insurrection, who once resided and who was buried there. But it came from an entirely different source. In the year 1796, John Brown, a rich merchant of Providence, Rhode Island, purchased at a mortgage sale a tract of land containing 210,000 acres, divided into eight townships, and extending across Herkimer county, and into Hamilton on the east, and Lewis on the west. The mortgage was held by Philip Livingston, and, amongst others, Aaron Burr and John Julius Augustine, a London merchant, were interested in the tract anterior to the date of the same. John Brown named his townships Industry, Enterprise, Perseverance, Unanimity, Frugality, Sobriety, Economy, and Regularity, all of which are doubtless practised by those who visit these regions, especially the sixth. He made some extensive efforts to settle this tract, all of which proved ineffectual. After his decease the tract remained in the possession of his family until within a few years, when if wee wild country in northern New York, known the tract remained in the possession of his family until within a few years, when it was sold to Robert R. Lyon, who contracted it to the Sackett's Harbor and Saratoga Railroad Company. From this his name has been applied to and become the generic term of the whole wilderness region, alterm of the whole wilderness region, al-though his tract properly comprises but a very small portion of it. Many call this re-gion the North Woods, but no term is so generally used as John Brown's Tract. It comprises more or less of nine counties of the State, viz: Hamilton, Herkimer, Lewis, St. Lawrence, Franklin, Clinton, Essex, Warren and Saratoga.
