LATER FROM BALTIMORE.

THE POLICE COMMISSIONERS.

The Rebels Getting Impatient.

The Reported Indian Troubles.

The Trial of the Baltimore Police Commissioners.

ANNAPOLIS, Md., Oct. 31.—The examination of the charges against the Police Commissioners was continued until 6 o'clock last night, and resumed again this morning at 10 o'clock. The defense expect to get through their evidence by noon, when there will probably be some rebutting evidence introduced by the prosecution.

Commissioner Hines was called to the stand yesterday by the counsel for the defense, in order that the Governor might question him, but he declined doing so and said if he desired to examine the Commissioners he would do so at their office in Baltimore.

The same conversation took place last night relative to the argument of the case. Mr. Alexander, for the Commissioners announced his intention to argue the case.

Mr. Lathrop urged the importance of disposing of the case without delay. He said they represented 14,000 disfranchised people of Baltimore. Time pressed, and if the Commissioners were removed, as they hoped and believed they would be, there was much to be done; many changes to be made before next Tuesday, the day of election.

The counsel for the defense said they did not wish to delay unnecessarily.

Mr. Alexander said they represented the Union men of Baltimore, and the Union sentiments of the country.

The Governor said that in order to accommodate the counsel, he would sit up to 12 o'clock, if necessary.

The Indians of the Plains.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—Commissioner Bogy, of the Indian Bureau, had a conference this morning with Gen. Sherman, at the headquarters of Gen. Grant, in relation to the temper and disposition of the Indians of the great plains of the West.

The new Commissioner appears to be anxious to investigate into the truth of the various rumors in relation to the Indian troubles.

Gen. Sherman will make a written report on this head through his superior officer, Gen. Grant.

From Canada.

MONTREAL, Oct. 31.—At a public dinner in the Hon. C. Cartier, last night, Gen. Sir John Michael, Canadian Chief, made a speech recommending the formation of a League of Nations, and pointing west, and also that the volunteer movement be extended over the entire British America.

The Canadian papers are discussing Mr. Seward's letter and the tone of the American press on the Fenian trials, and generally say that the threats of many American papers who are morally Fenian accomplices, will do the prisoners more harm than good, and that the hanging of Captain Beale, Kennedy and others by the United States during the late war.

Fenian Meeting in St. Louis.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 31.—A large meeting of Irishmen was held at the Court House last evening, at which resolutions were adopted strongly condemning the late action of the Canadian courts, in the cases of Col. Lynch and Father McMahon, and characterizing the infliction of the death penalty for political offences as barbarous, cruel, and in opposition to the spirit of the age and humane teachings of civilized nations, and expressing thanks and gratitude to President Johnson and Secretary Seward for their prompt action in behalf of Irish-American citizens.

Naval Affairs.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—Patches have been received by the Navy Department from Rear Admiral Palmer, commanding the Third Atlantic Squadron, dated at Porto Rico, Oct. 22nd, announcing the arrival and departure on that day for Havana.

The Mackinaw and Florida were at Porto Rico, all week. On inquiry at the Navy Department, it is ascertained that no monitors have been sold to any foreign governments, nor have any foreign governments officially intimated a desire to make such investment.

It is true, however, that private parties, all of them American citizens, have made a proposition, without stating for what purpose, to purchase, but the Government has decided not to sell any of that class of ships, whether they be built in the Government Navy Yards or outside by private parties.

Georgia.

AUGUSTA, Oct. 31.—The cholera has disappeared from Savannah. About 300 negroes from Bibb and Hancock counties are preparing to leave for Liberia on the ship Galcauda.

The Moon Telegraph says the city is furnishing from six to ten tons per day for colored parties.

Parties engaged in sinking a well in McLenore's Cove, Walker county, Georgia, struck a vein of flowing oil. The location is about fifteen miles from Chattanooga.
