New York, November 1st.—The New York, Newfoundland and London Telegraph Company have decided upon several important improvements and new enterprises, in order to insure perfect telegraphic connections with the prominent commercial cities of the United States and Europe.

The Navy Department, this morning, received despatches from Admiral Rieu, commanding the East India Squadron, dated Straits of Simonassaki, Japan, July 31st, 1866.

Before the departure of the Hartford from Nagasaki, the Governor of that city informed the foreign Consuls that the Tycoon was at war with the Prince of Nagato, Lord Shimazu, and requested that no vessel of-war or merchant vessel should pass through those Straits and the Inland Sea.

Admiral Bell informs the Department that several cases of dysentery and fever had occurred on the Hartford and Wyoming, contracted at Hong Kong and Shanghai, but the change of air from the pestiferous coast of China had nearly disappeared.

Despatches have been received at the Navy Department from Rear Admiral Pearson, commanding the South Pacific Squadron, on board the United States steamer Powhatan, at Callao, Peru, under date of Oct. 13th. All well.

Fortress Monroe, Va., Nov. 1.—The schooner Lucy Alexander, from Areoleto for Baltimore, arrived here last night. She reports that the brig Castana and F. W. Wilson, for Baltimore, with cargoes of sugar, were lost in the bay part of October near Areoleto. She brought part of the crews and the passengers.

Major-General Schofield, accompanied by Brigadier-General Blunt and his staff, arrived this afternoon from Richmond, on an inspecting tour. He was received by a salute from the fort, and reviewed the troops of the garrison. He will return on Saturday to Richmond.

Rev. Mr. McCloskey, brother of Archbishop McCloskey, of New York, President of the American College at Rome, has been here on a visit to some old friends. He went North to-night.

The United States District Court was held this morning, at Norfolk, Judge Underwood presiding. Very little business was done beyond the delivery of a charge to the Grand Jury, in consequence of the absence of the District Attorney, L. H. Chandler.
