GREAT UNION VICTORIES IN TEN STATES.

The Rebel Sympathizers Triumph in Maryland and Delaware.

We give below the returns received of the result in the twelve States which held elections yesterday. It will be seen that the glorious Union cause has received no check North or West, but that it is everywhere triumphant, from Massachusetts to the Far West. In Maryland and Delaware the rewalt has been adverse.

New York, Nov. 6, 7 P. M.—The returns come in slowly. It looks as if Hoffman will have 40,000 majority in the city, and probably more. Greeley leads his ticket largely, but of course will not be elected. From up the Hudson Fenton gains.

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
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
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
