Captain Golds-borosgh states that on the 15th of September, while anchored off Muscat, he received a visit from an officer of the Imaun, welcoming him to the port and offering unusual civilities. A salute of twenty-one guns was fired from the Shenandeah, and was promptly returned from the batteries on each side of the harbor. The next day Captain Goldsborough, in company with several of his officers, visited the Imaun at his palace, and was hospitably received. The American ships Clyde, of Salem, and the Hellespont, of Marbhehead, were at anchor in the cove waiting to take in carge.

On the morning before the Shenandoah left Muscat, the uncle of the Imaun landed with fifty men and took pressession of one with fifty men, and took possession of one of the forts, and opened a fire on the town, which was immediately returned from an opposite battery and from field-pieces the transfer that the unaround the palace. TONNAGE DUTIES .- The Treasury Department has just issued a circular on the subject of the tonnage duty, which is imposed for the purpose of raising revenue, and is levied upon all vessels engaged in foreign commerce, without regard to their denomination as to structure or mode of propulsion. The same may be said of those in the domestic trade, unless especially excepted, and are all included under the general term—vessel. It is to be collected accordng to American admeasurement, as prescribed by law, on all excepting French vieseels, whose tonnage will be ascertained from the registers. The cates of tonnage duties remain as they stood pravious to the acts of July 14th, 1802, only as they were increased by that act and the amendment of March 3d, 1865. No new or additional duties have been since imposed, excepting as a penalty on undocumented tugs. The circular is full and complete as to vessels subject to tonnage duties. All boats, barges and flats, not used for carrying passengers, nor pro-pelled by steam or sails, which are floated or towed by tug boats or norses, and used exclusively for carrying coal oil, minerals and agricultural products to market, are brought under the Internal Revenue tax, and are wholly excepted from customs charges, even though they enter the waters under Admiralty jurisdiction, so long as they retain that exclusive character, and only transport coal oil, mineral products and agricultural products to market, and if under twenty-five tons burden, are vessels exempt from all taxation.

ENVALID PENSIONS.—Secretary Browning has given a decision in an appeal from the action of the Pension Office in regard to claims for the increase of invalid pensions, under the act of June 6, 1866. His construc tion of the law is in substance contained in the following paragraphs, quoted from the decision: "Three grades of disability are described in the act; but it is not to be pre invalid pensioners who received the maxi mum amount under former laws would be therefore, entitled to its liberal provisions The applicant for the increased allowance must affirmatively prove that his disability is one of the specific character mentioned in the act, or is equivalent thereto, unless the fact be sufficiently established by the proofs accompanying the original application. I am of the opinion that the proofs do not bring a case within the act in question unless they show that the disability is permanent, and incapacitates the applicant from performing manual labor to the same extent as it do had lost a hand or foot."
