Conversion of Bonds.

The rapid conversion at the Treasury Department of 7-30 notes into 5-20s, is attended with many difficulties on account of the number of lost or stolen 7-30 notes sent to the department. Banks and persons dealing in 7-30s should remember that although all the coupon bonds of the government are issued payable to bearer, so that they will pass by delivery, and are good, though lost

pass by delivery, and are good, though lost or stolen, when in the hands of a bona fide holder. The case is different with the 7-30s, which are issued in blank, but with the words "on order" instead of "or bearer," imprinted on the face. As long as a 7-30 note remains thus in bank it passes by delivery like a coupon bond, and a bona fide purchaser for value can collect the same, notwithstanding it has been lost or stolen but in the case where the holder of the seven but in the case where the holder of the seventhirty bond fills the blank space with his
name, the note then becomes his property,
payable to him or order, and he cannot
thereafter be deprived of his title by any loss
or larceny of the note, any more than the
holder of a draft or check payable to his
order; and this is the law, notwithstanding
his name may have been skilfully extracted
by acid or otherwise, so as to leave not trace

If the holder of the note can prove clearly that his name was written once on the face of the seven-thirty, his title is good, notwithstanding the erasure, and even against a hone fide holder for value, and will be recognized by the Treasury Department, and upon proof, the note will be paid to him. All persons dealing in government secu-

All persons dealing in government securities ought carefully to bear in mind the foregoing peculiarity of the seven-thirty notes, which may, as stated, become converted into negotiable securities, payable only to order, which cannot be the case with any of the coupon bonds of the government.

A Little Boy Frightened to Death.

[Correspondence of the Daily Visconsin.]
